

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

I have continued to correspond with Cllr. Lee Scott of Essex Highways and Cllr. Ray Gooding of Essex CC who have told me that the works are complete.

Here are some sections of the ongoing emails. I sent a lengthy one including three photographs and locations of 18 potholes, but pointed out that this is not a definitive list.

4th October. Response from Cllr. Scott. "I will ask officers today as like Ray I was told works were done but will check"

5th October. Response from Cllr. Gooding "Can I ask you to look back at the notes I sent you on 22nd September please and you will see that I said that the final resurfacing would not be completed until after North Hall Road is reopened because that work requires the closure of Ugley Road and it is not practical to have both roads closed consecutively. My understanding is that the interim works have been completed as suggested in my previous email and I am pleased that Lee is checking the actual status with the officers who will update us on that. "

5th October. My response to Cllr. Gooding: "Thank you for your email and I look forward to hearing what the officer has to say to Cllr. Scott. I have never disputed the timing of the resurfacing. However, as you will also know from my many emails that it is the filling of the potholes in the meantime which has been my main concern as they are dangerous to all forms of traffic. As you can see from the photographs attached within the last email, many potholes have not been filled. Perhaps, you could detour down that road, as it is less than 4 miles from Stansted, so that you can see for yourself the condition of the sides of the road. Do come along at any time, preferably within half an hour of school arrival or departure times so you can get the full experience of being pushed into the potholes to pass other road users, including lorries. Afterwards, you are very welcome to have a reviving cup of tea at 9, Mill Road."

7th October. No responses received.

Maybe next week?

I keep hoping that the potholes will be filled by the time the magazine is printed, Third time lucky perhaps.



In their beautifully illustrated talk we saw images of Elsenham Hall; home to Sir Walter Gilbey, a great benefactor to the village. The jam factory was established by him and the village pump was donated by him. The canopy to it was a memorial to his wife who died in 1896.

Other scenes included the old village school and its pupils and staff and Barratt's shop with the manager and assistants posing for posterity. We saw views of the High Street, the Crown Inn, the Church dating from the 12th century and Golds nurseries. A trip to Elsenham wouldn't be complete without looking at the station and we were treated to early views of this landmark and in fact Ray Franklin was the last passenger on the old Elsenham-Thaxted line!

As an encore to their fascinating talk we saw an episode from the BBC documentary A-Z of English villages when Elsenham was the 'star'.

In the Garden

Well Dear Reader, another year nearly gone. It's already November and still no offers of pantomime! Oh well, I guess I'll just have to stick to gardening.

We have had an extraordinary summer this year, but although we have had loads of sunshine and high temperatures, it has been a challenging year for gardeners. Thankfully, September and October brought us a little more rain, which helped enormously. I have planted out quite few herbaceous perennials. Planting them now will give them a lot more time to establish a good root system over the winter months. This is pretty much the last opportunity to plant tulip bulbs. You can plant them later, but the flowers will be a lot smaller. If you have bulbs of any type left over, you can keep these for a long time in a refrigerator. Put them in net bags and they should last until next spring.

Climbing roses should be cut back now, leaving two or three buds on the side shoots and summer flowering shrubs like Lavatera, Cotinus and Buddleia should have their foliage reduced by about a third. When pruning, try to make your cut about half a centimetre above a leaf joint. Tie in the main stems to keep the plant stable.

Apple and pear trees can be pruned any time from now until next February. Cut out any inward growing branches and reduce leaders by at least one third, once again, making your pruning cut about half a centimetre above an outward facing bud. Cut out any dead branches and try to open out the centre of the tree. A good tip, given to me many years ago, is that a bird should be able to fly straight through the centre of the tree without hesitating.

This is the month for cleaning and tidying and battening down the hatches for winter. Keep raking up the fallen leaves to prevent moss forming on your lawn. If you have a pond, it is important to try and keep leaves out of it, as they can release harmful agents as they decay. A good way of doing this is to cover the pond with garden netting. This can regularly be removed, cleared and then repositioned. This will also provide protection against the ever-voracious herons.

Any soft fruit planted this month should be cut back hard. The aim is to prevent an immature plant fruiting before it is ready, thus suffering permanent damage. If you have given your tree fruit a summer pruning, pruning now should not be too onerous. Cordon and espalier trained trees should have their side shoots cut back to three dormant buds from the main stem and sub-laterals (shoots growing from the side shoots) should be cut back to one dormant bud.

Continue cutting down herbaceous perennials which have finished, with the exception of Chrysanthemums, Euphorbia and Sedums. These are best left

alone until spring, as the dead foliage provides some protection against winter frosts. Try to leave some foliage as shelter for wildlife if you can. If you have any digging to do, such as renovating flower beds or lawns, now is the time to do it. At this time of year, rough digging is all that is needed, as the frosts will break down any large lumps. This year the ground is probably a bit harder than normal, so you may find it easier to dig with a fork rather than a spade.

Now is the time to be planting up tubs and baskets for winter colour. Most nurseries will have a selection of small perennials and even small shrubs which can be used alongside the usual favourites like Pansies, Violas and Wallflowers. I use Skimmia, Hellebore, Heuchera, Trailing Ivy, Geum and quite a few others. One advantage of using this type of plant is that they can be planted into the garden later on. Under-plant these with bulbs of short stemmed spring flowers like Téte a Téte Daffodils, Greigii Tulips and Dwarf Irises.

If you have bird feeders in your garden, make sure you keep them topped up now, so that the birds become confident of their positions. In severe weather, birds use most of their energy looking for food. If they know there is a regular supply close to hand, it improves their chances of surviving harsh winters.

In the vegetable garden or allotment, you can plant early Broad Beans, such as "Aquadulce" or the more compact "Sutton" and also peas Sow broad beans in the normal way, but peas should be sown more thickly, to allow for winter losses. If you grow onions or shallots, you will be all too aware of the annoying habit that birds have, of pulling them out of the ground pretty much as soon as they are planted. A simple way to avoid this is to cut off the tips of the onion sets when you plant them. They are then much less obvious to the birds.

Well Dear Reader, just time for one of my nugges of little-known information before I leave you. Don't throw away those used tea bags, they can be used to make an iron-rich feed for your acid-loving plants such as rhododendrons etc. The extra iron will help to keep the leaves of these lime-hating plants a beautiful dark green. Keep a jug of water handy and drop the used tea bags into it. At the end of the week you should have a jug full of dark brown liquid. Simply water this directly around your plants. This iron-rich liquid also provides a great feed for houseplants.

That's enough pearls of wisdom for now, so until next time, Happy Gardening.

From the Church

Thought for the month from Reverend Louis Wilson ...



Autumn is unmistakably in the air and with it the season of remembrance made more poignant than ever by the absence of Queen Elizabeth II.

A few years ago, I visited the Tyne Cot Cemetery at Passchendaele in Belgium, as well as some of the D-Day landing beaches in Normandy. Tyne Cot contains a staggering 12,000 graves, as well as recording the names of 35,000 British and Commonwealth soldiers missing in action as a result of the Battle of Passchendaele in 1917. It is the largest Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery in the world. When Tyne Cot was opened in 1922, King George V marked the occasion with these words:

"We can truly say that the whole circuit of the Earth is girdled with the graves of our dead. In the course of my pilgrimage, I have many times asked myself whether there can be more potent advocates of peace upon Earth through the years to come, than this massed multitude of silent witnesses to the desolation of war."

A better reflection of the appalling tragedy of war you could not find, but just a generation later, there was sadly more to come. At the Canadian Juno Beach Museum in Normandy, I came across some other very striking words. At the outbreak of WWII, the Canadian Prime Minister was William Mackenzie King. This is what he broadcast to the nation to explain Canada's entry into the war:

"The Nazi doctrine of force is the very antithesis of what one finds in the Christian gospel. If it prevails there will be, as I see it, an end to our Christian civilization. It will prevail, unless men are prepared to sacrifice their lives in opposing it. The time has come when to save our Christian civilization, we must be prepared to lay down our lives for its preservation. The young men who are enlisting in our forces today, to serve on land, on the sea and in the air, are first and foremost defenders of the faith. Like others who have gone forth to battle in the past, they are placing their lives at the service of King and country."

It is an astonishing speech. As someone else has written, by today's standards, the words would be considered politically incorrect. But if you have read any accounts at all of what the Nazis and their sympathisers inflicted upon the Jews and other minorities of Central Europe, I'm afraid it is hard to disagree with the Canadian Prime Minister.

Reports and Recommendations

(1) Greens and Village Estate – Cllr. Baker:

- (a) Greens damage -
- (1) Erosion General greens erosion in the village causing other potholes. Cllr Leech previously presented a comprehensive document with supportive photographs and examples of honeycomb matting. It was agreed that the Chair and Cllr Leech would identify where this sort of protection would be useful. Chair and Cllr Leech to arrange a date to identify areas for repair.
- (2) Flooding on Greens at Crow Street Now repaired by Affinity Water.
- (3) Water leak by Prompt Corner residents have reported a leak and it is currently being investigated by Affinity Water.
- (b) Gravelling over and parking on Greens at Bell Cottage, High Street The Chair of HPC has written to the owner of Bell Cottage on 20/08/22, asking them to reinstate the greens and refrain from parking on greens, as a section of greens owned by HPC outside Bell and Rose Cottages was gravelled over on 19/8/22 and the owner of Bell Cottage is now using this area to park a vehicle. There has been no response by the resident to our letter nor have the greens been reinstated to date. The PCSO has been asked to speak to the resident regarding parking on the greens. Legal advice has also been obtained by the Chair and HPC has reluctantly instructed their solicitors to commence legal proceedings against the resident.
- (c) Signage by Bell House for new properties The owners of the new properties would like to install signage similar in style to Highfields to indicate the location of the new properties behind Bell House. Following a discussion this was agreed nem con.
- (d) *General Maintenance* The annual Village sign, Bus Shelter and noticeboards maintenance has now been carried out.
- (e) **Queen** The Parish Council would like to thank Cllr Rutterford for producing a wonderful floral tribute on behalf of HPC in honour of our Queen and all residents for their beautiful flowers and those involved in looking after the floral displays. The Parish Council also thanks Cllr Lee for following the protocol with the flag lowering and raising.
- (f) Village ponds Our Ecologist Will O'Connor previously gave a short presentation about the Farming & Wildlife Advisory Group which has written to the Parish Council about a funded pond conservation project they are delivering on behalf of Natural England. The clerk will confirm to Will O'Connor which ponds the Parish Council would include in the project with a potential new pond in the Hill Top Wood so that he can report back to the Group.

- (g) Salt bins it was previously agreed to replace the School Salt bin and reposition the Pledgdon Green bin and remove the Chickney Road bin. School salt bin has been purchased and will be installed shortly.
- (h) Village Hall Clerk has paid the second instalment of the HPC grant (£2500) to the village hall.
- (i) PCSO planned review meeting has been postponed. New date to be confirmed.
- (j) Defibrillator training Defibrillator Training in OSCA took place on 10^{th} September.
- (k) Pledgdon Green cutting Update from Cllr Rutterford confirming the green has been mown without charge and thanks the farmer for undertaking this. Cllr Rutterford will liaise with the farmer to find out if this can be baled.
- (1) Management of Pledgdon Green There is a bough overhanging a resident property which needs cutting back. Resident is obtaining quotes. Cllr Rutterford has been liaising with County Cllr Gooding and the Essex Records Office to establish who has responsibilities and ownership of the common land. Following a discussion, it was agreed that the clerk would look at the legal documentation with a view to the Chair instructing our solicitors to confirm the position.
- (m) budget consultation The clerk has previously circulated an email from UDC regarding a consultation on what its spending priorities should be for 23/24. Cllrs to report back to the Chair who will submit HPC's views.

- UTT/22/1228/FUL proposed Installation of concrete base and pony shelter in paddock area. Relocation of existing oil tank, Pledgdon Green Farm Brick End Road – The Parish Council has submitted comments regarding proposed vehicular access over the common land and the property boundary.
- UTT/22/2518/CLE proposed Certificate of lawfulness for existing installation of solar panels on the south facing roof, Hornbeam Cottage Starr Road
- UTT/22/2678/HHF proposed Garage conversion to annexe including front extension, Pear Tree Cottage Wood End Green

<u>Breaches</u>: Continuing breaches at Cedar Cottage- This is now under an enforcement notice which becomes operational and effective on 31/1/22. Parish Council continues to monitor the situation.

Appeals:

APP/C1570/W/20/3250328 - UTT/19/1777/FUL - Land South of Brick End – appeal allowed, costs refused.

APP/C1570/W/22/3300023 - UTT/21/0247/OP - Outline application with all matters reserved except access, layout and scale for the demolition of two existing buildings and erection of three new buildings, together with creation of a Craft Hub and reformation of existing parking areas with associated landscaping, The Rise Brick End, appeal hearing all representations by 25/8/22. Update by Cllr Rutterford who has been liaising with County Cllr Gooding, Broxted Parish Clerk and UDC. Hearing to take place on 11 October 2022.

Developments:

Mill Road Development: The Chair_wrote to UDC planning on 11/1/22 requesting information regarding the S106 Agreement and will continue to ensure that the Parish Council is kept informed on matters relating to the development. The Chair has now received a response from the UDC development manager. The Chair has asked UDC to provide any updates as soon as they hear from the developer.

Bloor Homes Development: The Chair has written to UDC planning regarding our opposition to an application by Carter Jonas on behalf of Bloor Homes that an Environment Statement is not required for the planning application for an additional 200 homes on the Bloor Site in Henham Parish. This is on the basis that it is unreasonable for Bloor Homes to believe the Environment reports for the 350 homes can be carried forward without serious re-examination of the cumulative effects of an additional 200 homes and potentially 200/400 more cars onto Henham Road and straight into Elsenham High Street and onto the disaster that is Grove Hill, Lower Street, and Chapel Hill in Stansted.

Planning application ref S62A/22/0007, 130 homes on land south of Henham Road, Elsenham - The application is in fact for 130 houses in Elsenham Parish opposite the Crown Public House. HPC opposes this development which will drive many more vehicles through Stansted Mountfitchet and will support Elsenham Parish Council in their objections. The Chair sent the Planning Inspectorate HPC's objection to this proposed development on 15/9/22.

Decisions:

North Hall Road: Road Closure: Notice received of intended closure of North Hall Road, due to commence on 12th February 2022 for a further 266 days The closure is required for the safety of the public and workforce while Essex County Council undertakes retaining wall. The link to the webpage is on the village website. Works to re-build the retaining wall commenced on 25 July 2022 and expected to take three months to complete. County Cllr Gooding has met with the Officers in September 2022 who are working on the North Hall Road project and provided Cllrs with the following update: The finalisation for the works to North Hall road will require that resurfacing equipment will be on the site to carry out the resurfacing of that stretch of the road and the opportunity will be taken to use this equipment, whilst it is in the vicinity, to carry out more extensive resurfacing of the Ugley road through to Patmore End. Much of the degradation is at the edges of the carriageway and inspections are currently being carried out to ensure that the necessary remedial work is in place to ensure the structural integrity of the road prior to the resurfacing.

<u>Update from Essex Highways 28/9/22:</u> Works to re-build the retaining wall along North Hall Road commenced as planned and good progress is being made on site. The installation of the sheet piles has recently been completed and we are now moving on to the next phase of works which involves the construction of the reinforced concrete capping beam. We have also carried out temporary make safe repairs to critical areas on the carriageway on Ugley Road. Our programme continues to be on schedule for completion at the end of October 2022. Photos showing the sheet piles being installed can be found on the scheme website. (see link to this on our village website).

An enforcement file has been opened ENF/21/0204/C regarding the application for a residential site application on North Hall Road. A new enforcement officer has been appointed by UDC.

Residents are encouraged to also report any matters to Essex Highways direct via the Essex Highways web site www.essex.gov.uk/highways (details also on the Henham Website), as the more people who complain regarding Highways matters the more likely something will get done. Residents are encouraged to report unsafe or dangerous parking in our village to: swilliams@uttlesford.gov.uk. Stansted Airport Limited operates a Freephone number for reporting suspected on-street airport related car parking. The Freephone number is: 0800 7312385

Waste and Minerals Development Issues

Update from ECC: Following an assessment of responses received to the public consultations held in 2021 and 2022, and a review of best practice, the decision has been taken to revise the end date of the Minerals Local Plan from 2029 to 2040. A new Call for Sites notification of an additional call for sites - which is taking place from 28th September to 9th November 2022 - is therefore required to reflect the revised end date of the Plan.

Governance

UDC are in the process of investigating both code of conduct complaints and these have been referred to independent external adjudicator for review.

Uttlesford District Councillors' Report

The Local Plan

We have some disappointing and unexpected news to report this month, although we think that you will already have some awareness of it. The Local Plan process is now regrettably paused while the evidence already assembled is now being cross checked and verified. This means that there is some delay in progressing to the next consultation phase, namely publication of the Regulation 18 Draft Plan, which we have previously reported on at length, and which was expected to commence on 2 November 2022.

This has come about as a result of a fresh appraisal of the work undertaken to date by a very recently appointed senior Planning Policy officer with substantial experience, during his career, of successfully guiding draft local plans through examination and approval, including, in particular, in rural areas.

He considered and advised that some work needed to be better coordinated and checked before going out to public consultation. He believes that the manner in which officers have been working post COVID, i.e., remotely from their homes, has led to a somewhat disconnected approach adopted to the presentations and evaluations which need to be made. So, coordinated team working has not been as effective as it should have been. The reasons for the delay and the steps to be taken, including a revised timetable, are being brought to a joint meeting of the Local Plan Leadership Group and Scrutiny Committee (Local Plan) on 10 October 2022. The causes and reasons identified, in the paper which will be presented to that meeting, are:

- "(i) a lack of integration between different workstreams, much exacerbated by remote working
- (ii) a high turnover of staff (both within the team and the management above it) and, at short notice, leading to loss of continuity and of consistency in completing tasks, and significant losses of local knowledge and understanding of the evolution of proposals.
- (iii) a lack of clarity of thinking, and shared team understanding, of the nature of the consultation document and the status of 'options' within it
- (iv) misguided responses to pressure e.g., rushing to complete tasks when the groundwork has not been completed; pace of programme meaning team members' concerns and suggestions being treated as a distraction from completing tasks; lack of detailed reporting on emerging (and inherent) problems.

(v) engagement between officers and members not undertaken efficiently, resulting in additional time-consuming tasks being undertaken"

A revised timetable is being worked up, but due to the local government elections in May 2023, there will be a pause in the work undertaken by the Local Plan Leadership Group/Councillors in the period between March and May 2023 (because of perceived political party issues): but, of course, work by officers will continue as usual in this period. It is thought that the period between Regulation 18 and 19 will, because of the more detailed and in-depth way in which the Regulation 18 Draft Plan will have been prepared, can be shortened a little and so there might be as little as some three months' net slippage before the draft plan is in a condition to be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate for examination.

We shall be able to advise you further as to an updated timetable next month. We shall of course be pleased to answer any questions residents might have as to this topic.

UDC Planning Performance

Planning Appeals

Uttlesford was put into designation so far as major planning applications were concerned, because we exceeded the 10% threshold set by the Government relating to the percentage of planning decisions refused by its Planning Committee which were subsequently overturned on appeal to the Planning Inspectorate. The philosophy behind this threshold is to encourage permission being given to greater numbers of dwellings; but the threshold bears no relation to any other considerations such as the locally driven considerations which are likely to have informed the original refusal decision. Designation means that applicants for prospective developments in excess of 10 dwellings (so called "majors") may in their option, apply for permission directly to the Planning Inspectorate instead of to UDC.

Planning Enforcement

This is progressing well and almost 800 cases, with extant enforcement notices, have been reviewed to ensure they are compliant with all relevant regulations. They will be placed on the register which will be open to public inspection. Due to GDPR the only enforcement cases that the public can access on the website are those where there are extant enforcement notices.

The enforcement officers remain active as well on new matters and so far, this year have opened 141 new cases while closing 134.

A performance report on planning enforcement is due to be published for Planning Committee in October and we will report further as to this next month.

Uttlesford Budget 2023/24

In these times of considerable economic hardship, Uttlesford DC is particularly keen to obtain the views of residents and the community businesses as to economic matters of concern to them, including as to the priorities for expenditure by the Council. The budget lays out how much UDC plans to spend on each of its main services and for every £100 received to fund services, the following is spent: £31 on Finance and General Administration: £26 on Environmental Services: £10 on Housing and Economic Development: £9 on capital financing: £5 on Communities and Partnerships and £19 on other costs, including reserves set aside for future years. These costs are funded in part through Council Tax, but other sources of income include business rates, New Homes Bonus (NHB), other government grants and commercial investments. A large proportion of expenditure is met by the commercial property investments made by UDC in recent years: Commercial investments - 26%, Business Rates - 20%, and Government funding, New Homes Bonus - 6%.

As we stated last month, we are looking at how as a small authority we can help each other with the Cost-of-Living Crisis. We want to support all local initiatives.

Local Initiatives

We have supported the table tennis club in Henham with the purchase of a table and wish the club good fortune in upcoming matches in the Harlow League.

What's in a name?

I live in Stansted Mountfitchet. The name is an





interesting one: Stansted derives from Saxon language meaning stony place; Mountfitchet is a corruption of Montfiquet, a village in Normandy. A man from there fought with William the Conqueror and was rewarded with land in Stansted.

Several of the Hundred Parishes have names ending in the Saxon STED, STEAD or TED. THAXted refers to the thatch that could be obtained there; BROXted seems to come from BROCK, the old name for badger.

Many of our towns and villages were recorded in the

Domesday Book of 1086. Duxford appears as Duchesuuorde, or Duc's Enclosure. Duxford has a number of locations where ancient travellers could FORD the River Cam. There are several more FORDs.

Domesday includes the manor of Pelham, possibly the home or farm of a man called Peola. The Norman family De Furneux added its name to establish Furneux Pelham, while part of the manor was destroyed by fire in the twelfth century and became 'burnt' or Brent Pelham. Stocking Pelham, seems to have adopted an Old English word meaning 'made of logs', perhaps referring to the parish church. HAM appears at the end of more parish names, suggesting that they also arose from someone's home or farm.

The parish of Quendon and Rickling was created in the 1940s, bringing together two settlements whose names related to an ancient queen. Quendon is recorded as Kuenadana in Domesday and may come from Old English words meaning a valley owned by the queen. Rickling was recorded as Richelinga and may be derived from Ricula who was the wife of Sledd, a 6th-century ruler of Essex.

Ten parish names end in ING, a Norse word for meadow or enclosure.
