

Letter

Dear Editor.

An update to the continued reporting of potholes in the village.

Cllr. Ray Gooding was at the Henham Parish Council meeting in May when he said that monies from Government have been allocated for potholes to be temporarily filled in the district. I do not understand why a temporary fill is better than doing the job properly, but it does go some way to reducing the immediate problem. He thanked me for my part in logging the potholes and broken drains.

You will have noticed that some potholes were indicated by a white paint surround, these were temporarily filled but a red paint line has since been put around a larger area. Essex Highways have sent the following reply to my query about this matter:

"Markings differ from Make Safes and full repairs. Make safes are repaired fully at later date, as in many cases a road closure is needed. Re the extra £17.4m this is additional to monies already in budget and is for the whole county."

I have logged the potholes in Dark/Lark Lane which leads to Little Henham. The ones on the Debden Road are in the process of being photographed in preparation for logging this month, June, so should be logged before you receive this update at the end of the month.

I am hoping that the logging of these potholes with the Council and Essex Highways will speed up the repairs.



Thriftwood Scouting campsite for a weekend of adventure. On arrival, excited leaders greet each other as we get the camp ready for our Cubs arrival. Our own children chip in and demonstrate all they have learnt during their time in Scouting, putting up tents whilst speaking excitedly of all that is to come and exploring the glen between the trees that will be our home for the weekend.

We walk to meet our Cubs at reception where they chatter with friends, waiting excitedly to see our camp. Goodbyes are said, parents wondering how they will fare overnight, but the Cubs don't look back, walking towards camp, carrying more bags than their parents ever thought possible, already away on their adventure.

Later that night the campfire is lit and an impromptu performance of circus skills emerges, with Cubs performing acts they have mastered at previous meetings. Cheeks aglow in the firelight as marshmallows are toasted and hot chocolate is drunk before we all head to our tents for some much-needed sleep.

The adventures continue bright and early the next morning, with stern words of safety and encouragement spoken at axe-throwing, followed by delighted cheers as axes hit targets! Then onto water zorbing with peals of laughter ringing out across the lake as we tumble and fall over the water trying to stay upright in our inflatable balls.

We send the Cubs home on Sunday, watching them walk into the distance, full of tales of their adventures, exhausted happy faces smiling up at parents, arms around shoulders. We are so proud of all they have achieved. This is the power of Scouting. Talk turns to our next camp as we pack up and how we can't wait to do it all again.





Audley End Volunteers

As you may already know Audley End House and Gardens is a 100 acre estate run by English Heritage, a national charity that cares for over 400 historic



buildings, monuments and sites - from world-famous prehistoric sites like Stonehenge, grand medieval castles like Dover and Tintagel, Roman forts, Hadrian's Wall and even a Cold War bunker!

Audley End was one of the greatest houses of early 17th-century England. In about 1605–14 Thomas Howard, 1st Earl of Suffolk, took an earlier house created by his grandfather Lord Audley on the site of Walden Abbey, and rebuilt it on the scale of a royal palace. Robert Adam transformed this house for Sir John Griffin Griffin in the 1760s, while Lancelot 'Capability' Brown remodelled the grounds, to create one of England's finest landscape gardens.



It is a truly magnificent place to visit, and Audley welcomed over 170,000 visitors last year.

Like most English Heritage sites, Audley is very dependent on volunteers who bring the buildings and grounds to life for visitors and our annual recruitment drive has now started.



Conservation Areas were introduced in 1967. District councils are responsible for designating them. The area must have special architectural and/or historic importance to merit protection. The aim is to protect an area rather than single buildings. Within each Conservation Area, there will generally be individual buildings that have additional protection, classified as Listed Buildings. There may also be a Scheduled Monument, or trees with a Tree Preservation Order, or buildings or spaces that have been designated as Assets of Community Value. There are varying degrees of protection for each of these designations, all aimed at preserving our heritage for future generations.

Uttlesford District Council covers around half of the Hundred Parishes area. The Council has designated thirty-three Conservation Areas within the area. For each it has published an appraisal that defines the area covered and explains the reasons for designation,



(see https://www.uttlesford.gov.uk/conservation-area-appraisals).

These appraisals are often a helpful source for the kind of information provided in the route descriptions for walks that can be downloaded from www.hundredparishes.org.uk.

East Hertfordshire has the second biggest representation within the Hundred



Parishes and this district council has designated twenty-six Conservation Areas. Their appraisals are also available and provide valuable insight,(see https://www.eastherts.gov.uk/planning-and-building/conservation-areas)
Similar appraisals are available from the other district councils that are represented within the Hundred Parishes: South Cambridgeshire, Braintree, North Herts, Chelmsford and Epping Forest.

Aid for Romania

The April lorry left on 26th and arrived safely after a five-day journey in Romania and clearing EU customs in Rotterdam. Some of the goods were given free to nearly forty needy families in Mărăşeşti (not far from the border with Ukraine), as nominated by the local Baptist church, and others by the town mayor. The better-quality goods are sold through our charity shop with proceeds helping the same poor sections of the population with health, education and improving their terrible housing conditions.

Our warehouse is now waiting to be filled for the October lorry. We are now collecting winter clothes and shoes for adults and children (anything for children under three years must be new). Single and Z beds with mattresses (sturdy iron or wooden framed beds are very desirable - no divans). Cushions, bed sheets, pillows, duvets and blankets (single and double), towels, toiletries (including loo rolls), umbrellas and rugs (no carpet offcuts). Building and workshop tools (also some types of gardening tools and sturdy wheelbarrows) and a sack barrow. Surplus school tables that have a two-foot clearance underneath ie not infant and stackable adult size chairs (please ask any contact with a local school or village hall who are/maybe re-furbishing). Sturdy chest of drawers (not flat pack built as these do not survive the five-day truck journey to Romania), bedside cabinets, kitchen/dining tables (either drop-leaf or removable legs). I am very short of BIKES. Irons and boards as well as air driers for laundry. Kitchen items (crockery, cutlery, utensils, pots/pans – especially big sizes eg preserving pans). Wheelchairs, crutches, walking sticks, zimmers. Bandages and dressings (absolutely NO pills, medicines or creams). Rucksacks and holdalls (must be in good condition). Costume jewellery. Footballs. Ear defenders for the manual workers and high-viz vests/jackets. Small toys such as push-along cars, cuddly soft toys etc (no big toys as these cause much jealousy!). Christmas trees and decorations etc.

Cash donations for the cost of the lorry are very welcome; it now costs more to send due to having to clear customs in Rotterdam.

Church News

Reverend Louis Wilson Writes

I recently took a wedding for a delightful couple in a neighbouring Essex benefice that is without a Vicar. In case they were at a loose end on honeymoon, I recommended they read a book on Christian marriage called On Marriage written by Tim Keller and his wife Kathy.

I suggested this because I have often found Tim Keller to be one of the clearest and most insightful pastors you can read. I was therefore very saddened to hear that he died just a few weeks ago aged 72. A cursory glance at my bookcase reveals at least six or seven books all of which I have read, and all of which I have found extremely influential.

In 1989, he moved to Manhattan and founded Redeemer Presbyterian Church. Then came a formidably fruitful quarter-century in New York City. Someone has commented: "Many preachers have built megachurches; relatively few have done so with conversion growth in a highly secular and urban environment steeped in biblical illiteracy".

Probably the most important Tim Keller book I've read is The Prodigal God, which is an explanation of one of Jesus' best known but least understood stories, the parable of the prodigal son. The word prodigal means recklessly extravagant. The younger son in the story is recklessly extravagant with his father's estate and yet his father delights to forgive and restore this son: a picture of how God the Father treats us.

What is often overlooked however is that the father in the story has two sons. On the surface the older son's behaviour is exemplary: where the younger son squandered his father's money in wild living, the older son worked dutifully in his father's fields. But where the younger son was lost in self-indulgence, it turns out that the older son was equally lost - but in self-righteousness.

It is such a reminder, actually a warning, that however good we are, however hard we work, however many rules we keep, whatever our appearance, without recklessly extravagant grace, we're all lost. And in Christ, recklessly extravagant or prodigal grace is what God offers us.

All this and more is what Tim Keller helped me see and for which I am very thankful.

In the Garden

Hello again Dear Reader, it's that time again. The Dragon publishing deadline approaches and I am nowhere near ready. Onwards and upwards then!



At the time of writing (early June), the weather has been very un-summer like. The evenings have been rather chilly and the days, although mainly dry, have also been cooler than one would expect. We have been promised some much warmer weather shortly, so fingers crossed.

Continue the pruning of early flowering shrubs. Unless the shrub has grown too large, it will only require light pruning. Cut stems which have flowered back to a strong new shoot and remove any dead or unwanted branches. As roses start to fade, dead head them with a pruning cut (cut the stalk bearing the dead flower back to just above an outward facing leaf joint with a diagonal cut) and you should get another flush of flowers. Continue dead heading other herbaceous perennials as they fade. If you cut the stems of Lupins and Delphiniums down to ground level, you may well get lucky and get a second show of flowers.

You can now start planting late-flowering bulbs such as Nerines. These will lengthen the flowering period of your garden into late September. I usually plant Nerines in pots and place them in the border, as they are not completely hardy in a harsh winter.

Chrysanthemums are approaching their flowering time about now. If you want fewer but larger blooms, remove the two smaller buds either side of the main bud. You can do the same with Dahlias if you wish.

Lift and store Hyacinth and Tulip bulbs, keeping only those in good condition. Lay them out in single layers in a cool dry place and leave them until they dry out completely. They can then be cleaned up and stored until it is time to replant them. Daffodil bulbs are usually okay left in the ground, where they will multiply over time.

If you are growing tomatoes in a greenhouse, keep picking the fruits regularly as they ripen, keep pinching out the side shoots as they appear and make sure the plants have adequate support. When they have set a maximum of six trusses, pinch out the tops. Under glass, feed the plants regularly with a proprietary tomato fertiliser such as Tomorite (other fertilisers are available). Be careful not to let the plants dry out, as this may cause the skins to split.

Another job that needs to be done this month is thinning apples. It may look promising having clusters of apples on your tree(s) but leaving them will result in a lot of small, tasteless fruits. Thinning them out will mean you will have larger, better tasting apples. With a narrow-pointed pair of snips (scissors will do the job just as well), reduce each cluster to one or two fruits. I know that this appears to be wasteful, but believe me, the remaining fruits will really thrive.

If you are growing raspberries, they will need pruning after they have finished cropping. Cut the canes which have fruited right down to ground level. You should be left with new healthy canes and these can be tied in ready for next season.

Once your soft fruit trees have finished cropping, these too can be pruned. These trees should never be pruned in winter, as this may well lead to an attack of silver leaf. Cut out any inward facing branches and trim the tree into shape, this is normally all that is needed at this time of year.

Now Dear Reader, let's talk about slugs and snails, the bane of the gardener's life. As you well know, I have as equable a temperament as most men, but show me a flower or vegetable bed which has been ravaged by these disgusting creatures and I turn into a Troll-like creature, stomping around and telling the world how I 'ate 'em wiv an 'atred wot wells up from the bottom of me 'eart''. I genuinely cannot find any redeeming factors for these slimy invertebrates, other than they are part of the food chain. Well, now that I've got that off my chest, I will endeavour to give you one (yes, I know I'm spoiling you) of my little known but useful tips to keep them at bay.

Squares of green mineral roofing felt, the kind that you may well have on your shed roof, is a great way to ensure the slimy pests cannot reach your plants. Cut a hole in the centre of a 6" (15 centimetre) square of felt, large enough to go around the stem of the plant, then make a cut from the edge of the square to the whole, so that you can slip it around the stem like a collar. This should keep them at bay, as the rough surface hurts their soft underbellies and for some reason, they seem to hate the smell of the felt. If you feel more creative, you can make the central hole a bit larger than necessary and fill the extra area with sharp grit or crushed eggshells. That should keep the little beggars away!

Oh well, I guess that's another month gone. Enjoy the rest of the summer and do take some time to admire your handiwork. Until next time, "Happy Gardening"

Chairman's report

I am very happy to report an uneventful year. After the rollercoaster years around the pandemic, I think we can count the year ended 31st January 2023 as a successful return to the norm.

For the last two years turnover and profit has settled down to a constant level, slightly higher than pre-Covid levels. My first thank you is to Angela who has been a team member for nearly 18 months now and has done a super job. She is very pro-active and works really well with the volunteers. This has helped to take some of the load off Linda.

Because of the minimum order and delivery charges, we now have Bestway deliveries every two to three weeks instead of weekly, otherwise the delivery charges could be well over £1500 per annum. In between times we get some stock from Bookers as we cannot get our chiller and freezer items from Bestway. A big thank you to Linda and Richard who make these collections at a cost of less than £10 per trip, as well as doing so much in the shop. The daily bread collection continues; thanks to all those volunteers involved in the rota.

The Post Office is an invaluable asset to the village opening three mornings per week, and our thanks go to the Parish Council for their financial support. We must also thank Sheila for helping us in the shop when she is on duty in the Post Office.

Thanks to all the amazing volunteers who do their shift in the shop week after week. It is their continued commitment that allows us to carry on. We are incredibly fortunate to have a strong community and so many lovely villagers willing to give of their time. Everyone involved should be very proud.

I must mention Carol. The high level of turnover and use of credit cards has resulted in a lot of extra work for Carol, who continues to cope without complaint. I must also thank the committee for quietly working behind the scenes to implement ongoing improvements and keep things ticking over.

There will be challenges ahead. We have food inflation running at over 15% that can disguise a reduction in the sales volume and general inflation pushing up overheads. I feel confident that providing the village continues to support us, we can meet those challenges and the shop will continue to thrive. Trevor Ellis-Callow, Chairman

Financial report

2022 was another good year for the shop. Turnover was stable at approximately £100,000, although this represents a fall in real terms with inflation remaining high. Slightly lower purchase costs combined with a small increase in interest rates saw profits rise to £3,674 from £2,888 last year. There was a small increase in the profit margin to 19% from 18% (versus the target of 14%).

Expenses were similar this year with the increase in wages offsetting the redundancy payment made to Graham last year.

The cost of the card machine was again approximately £800. This cost will be fully covered by a forthcoming investment of surplus funds with a building society, thanks to the recent increase in interest rates.

A new lock and keys, and a vacuum cleaner were purchased during the year.

We again thank Trevor Judd for all his help with the accounts, VAT, PAYE and general support!

Also, many thanks to Judy who took on responsibility for internet banking whilst I was on holiday.



Reports and Recommendations

Greens and Village Estate – Cllr. Baker:

Greens damage – Erosion – works are ongoing.

Construction damage by Hollybank – Cllr Lee is monitoring the situation and is in discussions with the contractor regarding a plan for the repairs.

Driveway – The owner of Hollybank has contacted the Chair requesting that a section of the driveway is bonded to allow for easy wheelchair passage, it would be a narrow strip and would not look different in appearance. Following a discussion it was agreed Cllr Lee would liaise with the owner.

Gravelling over and parking on Greens at Bell Cottage, High Street – Chair and Cllr Fisher to meet on site to review extent of proposed greens repair works. Coronation commemoration – A generous resident who is very skilled at ironmongery has kindly offered to design and make a sculpture to celebrate the coronation. Cllrs have approved the design and Cllr Fisher will liaise with the resident.

Development at Saffron House – Cllr Fisher declared an interest and absented himself from any discussions. There was then a discussion regarding the owner of Saffron House's recent contact with the Chair with regard to developing the paddock behind the house.

Defibrillator – The Parish Council thanks the resident who has so kindly given up her time to maintain the defibrillator and thanks the new volunteers who are helping by taking on the responsibility.

Village ponds/woodland – The Parish Council will review the possibility of asking woodland organisations/charities to maintain the woodland on behalf of the Parish Council.

Village Hall – Update from Cllr Fisher who mooted an idea for the Parish Council to launch a community grant scheme, available for not-for-profit organisations/residents in order to support their use of the Village Hall. It was agreed that Cllr Fisher would research this further and provide a proposal for the next meeting.

Management of Pledgdon Green –Solicitors have now been instructed and have quoted £500-750 plus VAT.

Coronation Event – Total approx. net cost to Parish Council was £2,165 (nb total gross cost was approx. £3,700 less £900 grant from UDC which the Chair applied for and £635 refund from fete committee for gazebos and ice machine which are fete committee assets).

Gigaclear – Gigaclear have applied for road closures on Mill Road and Dark Lane 30/6/23. Chair is signing the Wayleave Agreement for greens access.

Parish Council is aware they would need to give careful consideration to the location of a large infrastructure box so that it is not an eyesore.

Annual Parish Meeting

On Thursday 1st June the Parish Council (PC) held its Annual Meeting. The Chairman Nick Baker addressed the meeting with an update of activities.

I want to start by introducing our councillors seated here down the front. Our Parish Councillors are Simon Lee, Mark Fisher, Peter Franklin, Garry LeCount. Three of our councillors are absent, Jonathan Leach, Matt Francis and Zoe Rutterford. We also welcome our new District Councillors, Petrina Lees, who also leads the ruling parting Residents 4 You, and Bianca Donald. We also welcome County Councillor Ray Gooding.

A main duty of the Council is setting, collecting, and managing the budgets; our receipts last year 22/23 were £68,605 and expenditure was £163.515. This overspend was due to the refurbishment of the Village Hall, which came to £105,224. The administration of this Parish Council budget is quite a demanding task, and we thank our clerk Mareike for her diligence in ensuring we follow governance rules and regulations, and Trevor Judd for preparing our accounts for audit.

The PCs invested assets at present total £1,022,451. The PC held the precept in 2022/3 making no increase at all. The PC understands that times are tough at present, and I think the freezing of the precept was a sensible step. Other notable everyday expenditure include grass cutting, tree maintenance, street furniture maintenance, war memorial garden, cemetery gardens, bus shelter maintenance and church cemetery maintenance and all the other assets that the Parish owns and maintains. We also manage the allotments, which are free to users if they are maintained properly.

The PC was very pleased to have contributed significantly to the refurbishment of the Village Hall. We would like to thank everyone who has volunteered over the past few years to help get us to this stage of the refurbishment and revitalisation of the Village Hall. We would like to thank Glenn Brennan for his early contribution to the project, Andy Eardley for bringing his expertise to delivering the building phase, Justin Rhodes as Chairman of the Village Hall Committee, and his role in securing valuable external grants, and the Village Hall Committee, all volunteers, working to help ensure a community hub for all. We also thank the contractors, who mostly came from the village, for their contribution. Lastly, I thank Mark Fisher who, as the PC councillor with the Village Hall responsibilities, has also taken a major role in seeing this ambitious project to a finish.

The other duties of the Council include liaison with the committees for the Village Hall, Shop, OSCA and the Church. The Parish Council is continuing to contribute the entire cost of the Village Post Office at £9,266 last year to ensure we keep our post office open. This PC is convinced that the Post Office and Village Shop are very important assets to our village and are determined to support it financially, as do many other of our residents support it with their time.

Five years ago, we introduced a new initiative aimed at stopping the disgusting dog fouling of our village greens. We distribute, free of charge, dog poo bags through the village shop. This year we have distributed 30,000 bags and, although we still get complaints about dog poo fouling the greens, we think the situation has improved. Without this initiative I think the problem would be much worse.

Another initiative which has continued this year, has the been the Neighbourhood Speed Watch under the watchful eye of Jim Heywood and Simon Bambridge. The Parish Council has installed two speed cameras in Mill Road and Chickney Road. Speed Watch have also requested and received a new speed gun which enables enforcement action to be taken against speeding motorists. Now that the speed signs are up and running, we can measure their effectiveness. Our initial impression is, that by studying the data downloaded regularly in the cameras, we are making a difference. Speeding in the village is getting under better control. At present Cllr Peter Franklin is trying to get authority for a further speed camera in Old Mead Road, he is hitting some Essex County Council Highways barriers, but we will keep trying.

A further initiative has been the continuing agreement to share a Police Community Support Officer with Stansted Mountfitchet. We have been allocated 33% of the officer's time, which cost the Parish Council £2994 last year. 50% of the police officers time is funded by Uttlesford District Council the other 50% funded by the two parishes. Essex Police are responsible for training and equipment. The Parish Council feels the reassurance of the presence of a police officer in the village is welcome. Our PCSO, who has joined us last year is Alex. He has already been very active in the village and works alongside village organisations, he is very approachable and would like to meet as many villagers as possible and discuss any areas of concern,

.

Another continuing initiative has been the updating and maintaining the Henham Village website. The website is being updated as we speak, under the watchful eye of our Clerk and Cllr Simon Lee. It is our aim that this becomes an interactive village resource for up-to-date information, events and sharing of all that is great in the village. The new website will also comply with the relevant

legal regulations. Along with Henham Facebook page the PC aims to use the website to communicate with the village.

Our clerk, Marieke deals with a plethora of emails and correspondence, all of which must be read in detail to ensure that any issues that impact upon Henham are recognised and dealt with. With planning issues Cllr Simon Lee heads a small subgroup that can comment and contribute to any decisions made by Uttlesford further down the line.

BT Open Reach has installed superfast broadband over the whole village. We all welcome the much better broadband. A new company Gigaclear is introducing ultrafast broadband to the village at the end of this year. This is an exciting development especially for residents running businesses or working from home. The PC will keep residents up to date with developments as they arise. The installation of the network will inevitably cause some disruption, but in our conversations with Gigaclear, we will aim to keep it to a minimum.

So, what at present are our concerns and issues? We have fought three large developments over the past years. The infamous Fairfield Development that we have fought against since 2007, and at one time reached 5200 houses between Elsenham and Henham, has concluded with the granting of 350 houses on the outskirts of Elsenham, east of the Crown pub wholly in Elsenham Parish and more recently a further 200 extra houses on Henham Parish land abutting this development making 550 in total. We fought against this extra 200 development to the very end and were bitterly disappointed when a Planning Inspector granted permission. The main obstacle to our objections was the UDC lack of a five-year housing supply and a Local Plan in Uttlesford.

A further development, which we fought and won at appeal, was 200 houses in Bedwell Road adjacent to Elsenham Station.

As you know, the third large development of 45 houses on land south of Vernon's Close ended in further disappointment. Having been unanimously refused by UDC Planning, the developer appealed against the decision and after a one-week hearing the appeal was allowed. Reading the lengthy Inspectors report the reader would be convinced the Inspector was going to refuse the appeal until the last page or two, when the failure of the five-year housing supply and lack of a local Plan, took precedent. We still await any progress on this development and hope to engage with the developer, once identified, to discuss issues.

One of the main duties of the Parish Council is to protect the Henham Conservation area.

The Parish Council will continue to oppose in -filling or developments onto plots in or near the conservation area of the village. The Conservation report completed in 2011 emphasises the importance of the open aspects and views through into the countryside in Henham. The sense of space together with our precious village greens are what makes Henham a great place to live. Your PC will fight tooth and nail to protect these features.

Fighting all these planning applications and contributing to the Local Plan is very time consuming and very expensive, but without our organisation and professional advice, and your support, both financially and your presence at hearings, we would already have had thousands of houses built between Elsenham and Henham, basically joining the two villages. We would also have had a Travellers site on the outskirts of the village and several unwelcome developments in the village itself. Your PC is not against sustainable development in the village, and we have already accepted in this plan period well over 100 houses including some affordable housing. On top of that we have the 200 houses on Henham Parish land abutting Elsenham. However, we will continue to fight against opportunistic development and developments that, in our judgement, spoil the beauty of the village. You can already see the traffic chaos in Stansted and there are another 1000 plus houses under construction. It is madness to construct so many houses without a proper supporting infrastructure. We have called on UDC to plan sensible settlements in the new Local Plan. Developments should be properly sustainable, with schools, shops, leisure, medical and other essential facilities built with the houses. A new community, not a rag bag of houses attached to an existing community.

As we move towards the third attempt to get a Local Plan in place at Uttlesford District Council we watch very carefully the intended housing sites in our parish. The "Call for Sites", which is the process where anybody can submit a site for housing to be considered in the Local Plan, has a number in the parish which we consider unsuitable. We are waiting for the list of sites that UDC consider have merit and we will be entitled to comment as to suitability. This is expected to arrive late summer and will be another huge amount of work for the PC.

I can't finish this segment without commenting on Essex Highways. The PCs engagement with Essex Highways is abysmal, from their refusal to accept that Grove Hill, Lower Street and Chapel Hill in Stansted are full, and cannot accept more and more construction traffic and traffic from new houses in Elsenham and Henham.

It is also difficult to contain one's anger at the handling of the North Hall Road project.....to take 2 ½ years to repair this road was unbelievable. The state of

the diversion through Patmore End was a disgrace. Your Council did everything within our power to speed this repair but all to no avail.

Fund raising is very important to fight these planning applications and I commend Cllr Mark Fisher for his monthly draw which raises money to fight these applications. This year it has raised £6450 and anyone who has not signed up for the village monthly draw please consider doing so.

Now let me spend a few moments talking about improving the fabric of the village. It is this PCs wish that Henham remains one of the most beautiful villages in the area.

Last year, with the help of a grant from Essex County Council Cllr Ray Gooding, we renovated the pond in Crow Street by School Lane, this work is still ongoing. We are grateful to Ray for his maintenance assistance, which this year was a new notice board in front of the village hall. We continue to maintain and improve our greens, our ponds, our street furniture and our trees, hedges, and paths. Our allotments are a pleasure to visit, we are full with twenty-two plots taken and one resident on the waiting list. I want to particularly commend Peter Smith and Chris Walker for their work on the allotment wooded area which they are turning into a natural bluebell wood with spring bulbs and seating. The continuing improvements to the allotments are a credit to them both.

We are constantly looking across the village to see any areas which need improving and as ever rely on residents' comments. Adjacent to the allotments is the cemetery which is administered on behalf of the PC by Linda Peake, Linda, we thank you for all of the tasks you do on behalf of the village.

Let me restate the council's policy on rights of access across our village greens. We will not allow any new right of access across our greens, and we are unlikely to allow any additional access across existing rights of access, save in the most exceptional circumstances, where we think an improvement takes place.

A couple of years ago we purchased the woodland opposite Hill Top Yard. This was purchased as the PC did not want another long and expensive planning application with the risk of a traveller's site. We are still considering the best way forward for this woodland to improve its natural diversity so watch this space.

I also wanted to mention the Kings Coronation Celebrations which followed on from the Queens Platinum Jubilee celebrations last year. I doubt that any village, town, or city enjoyed better organised events than the one we had. The PC has already thanked those residents, including Simon Bambridge and fete committee, who worked so hard to make the event such a success, but our thanks also goes out to Cllrs Simon Lee, Mark Fisher and Peter Franklin for their roles in organising such a splendid occasions.

So, I hope I have painted a scene of a very busy industrious and, I hope successful Parish Council.

It remains for me to thank the Parish Councillors for their hard work in supporting the village. This has been a very busy period for the Parish Council. I think few residents would have any appreciation of the administration required to run a Parish Council and it gets more every year. I would like to thank all the councillors for their considerable efforts in giving up their time to make this village the great place to live in.

Lastly, I particularly want to thank our Clerk Mareike who does such a splendid job. Hardworking, always amenable, always helpful, we are very lucky to have her. We do have a progressive forward-thinking Parish Council and I believe that our village is in good shape and will get even better with our future plans.
