

Below is a copy of a letter from Elizabeth Sinnott to the Bishop of Chelmsford

Dear Bishop Guli

As a resident of Henham near Bishops Stortford I am writing to you as I feel very upset about the condition of the churchyard at St Mary's Church in the village to which I make a small annual financial support and have done for over 50 years.

There is an extensive building project taking place in the church yard and a large portion to the northside of the church and graveyard is undergoing serious disruption. However, the majority of the churchyard is not affected by the building work and the condition of the rest of the churchyard is an utter disgrace. My late mother's ashes are buried in the Garden of Remembrance and my late husband has been buried in the churchyard for the last 33 years, having died very young. Today, 7th March is his anniversary, a day my family, including his sister who is resident in the village too, commemorate. I was accompanied by a family friend today to visit the grave, and we were horrified at the condition and obvious lack of care the PCC is taking. Have they no respect for the graves and the loved ones who are buried there or compassion and consideration for the living loved ones who visit? Whether we agree or disagree with the monies being spent by the PCC on the building work, this work should not in any way detract from the upkeep and respect to the rest of the graveyard.

I regularly visit my husband's grave and have over the years accepted that winter is not the easiest time for maintenance, but with the vast amount of money being spent on the church extension, surely some should be spared for the maintenance and upkeep of the graveyard which seems to be totally ignored. The grass which had been left to grow excessively long has now been mown, or should I say chewed, and left in random lumps all over the area, and what has been missed by the machinery is being ignored. It looks like a neglected paddock.

Graveyards are not the happiest places to visit, but at least they could be kept so that those who do have, unfortunately, to visit them, can get some comfort from the fact that their loved ones' memorials are being respected and cared for.

I look forward to your comments and favourable reply.

### **Remembering the Deluge**

As you read this in April, the terrible February weather may seem a distant memory as warmer spring weather beckons. My rainfall gauge recorded 114mm rain (4½in) - a forty year February record. Whilst our Henham monthly average is 2in, February is actually our driest



month with 1¼in making the deluge three and a half tmes wetter than normal!! Compare this to February last year when we had only 3mm rain - nature averages things out.

Do you remember the flooded road by Pledgdon Hall and wading through flood water on North Hall Road towards Newport? My lawn seemed to be in a constant state of squelchy, soggy mess but it still looked green from the kitchen; it turned out to be mainly moss – still less mowing! The rain found all our blocked gutters and weak points in the flat roofs. But we should consider ourselves lucky that we live in 'Henham-on-the-Hill' and not in places such as Ingatestone (nr Brentwood) where cars were flooded up to their windows.

Our gardens were not the only areas suffering. Farmers have rain damaged crops because the water could not get away on the field margins where the tractors turn. Here the crops are very thin with poor roots and we will see these brown areas suffering all the way to harvest. In fact, looking at my records since last July, each month has been wetter than normal with only August being average. So it is not surprising that the crops are suffering. All this wet means that the planned autumn sowings were not completed and so there will be more spring crops, which in turn will be planted later due to the wet soils. All this means that yields will be lower but prices are unlikely to be better as a result because we are on world values.

Here's hoping for better times as we get into spring. Knowing our luck we will have a hosepipe ban this summer!!

### In the Garden

Good day to you Dear Reader, I feel I should perhaps be writing about swamp management rather than gardening, but we get what we are given, so here goes.

The old idea that you cannot prune roses once they have started to shoot is a myth. Of course, you should probably have done them by now, but given the weather we have experienced this year, it is understandable that we are all a bit late on some things.

If you have planted new roses, make sure to keep them well watered in prolonged dry spells (I promise I'm not being facetious). Michaelmas Daisies, Rudbeckia and Monarda which have outgrown their positions should be lifted, divided and replanted if, that is, the ground is not too soggy. If you have rhododendrons which have become straggly, you can cut them back quite hard if you wish. Forsythia will have finished flowering, so they can be pruned now. They flower on new growth, so cut back the branches which have flowered to within two buds of the old wood and try to avoid cutting into old wood unless it is overcrowded or dead.

There is still a strong chance of frost in April, so be prepared to cover tender plants with fleece if necessary. If plants do get affected by frost, a good tip is to defrost them slowly by covering them early in the morning with newspaper or spraying them with cold water to thaw them slowly. That way they may well survive.

Mow the lawn regularly, lowering the blades gradually until they are at the required height. If you haven't applied a weed and feed, you can still do so. In wet, mild winters such as we have just experienced, moss develops quickly in lawns and can soon cover large areas. You can treat these areas with lawn sand, but if you have a lot of grass this can be pretty expensive. There is a much cheaper way of getting the moss, which I wrote about last year and which I will now remind you of. Grate two ounces (60 g) of ordinary household soap and dissolve it in 4.5 litres of water. Use a sprayer or watering can to spray this on the affected areas. Leave, and in about seven to ten days the moss will have turned black. Rake out the dead moss with a metal lawn rake and re-seed. A friend has told me that the same effect can be achieved using washing up liquid. Talking of lawns, here is another of my "quirky" facts: Garden centres, for obvious reasons, like to make you spend your money – often unnecessarily. Take roll-on spot weeders for example. This is simply ordinary weedkiller in a fancy applicator. Make your own, quickly and easily by taking an empty roll-on

deodorant container, prise off the ball, wash out thoroughly and fill with ordinary lawn weedkiller, diluted as per the instructions. Push the ball back on and *voila*, you have a roll-on lawn weedkiller applicator. Oh yes, please remember to label it clearly, you don't want to be using that on your armpits!

Now is the time to plant onion and shallot sets. A good idea is to plant garlic bulbs in with your broad beans. This has the added advantage keeping those pesky blackflies off the bean plants. You can also start french beans, courgettes and cucumbers under glass. On sunny days, open the greenhouse doors to increase ventilation. Pot on plants grown from seed and provide support for tomatoes which are staying in the greenhouse throughout the summer.

There are many ways of increasing your stocks of plants and flowers cheaply. Collecting seeds from existing plants is one of the most obvious, but one of my favourite ways is to do so by taking cuttings from both existing and new plants. Chrysanthemums are a good example. Look around your local garden centre for a good, bushy plant with lots of new shoots. Take as many 3inch to 4inch (8 -10 cm) cuttings as you can, then remove all the lower leaves with a sharp knife, leaving only the top pair. Fill a clean plastic pot with seed and cutting compost (a good multi-purpose compost will do) and, using a dibber or a pencil, plant the cuttings around the edge of the pot. If you wish, you can dip the ends of the cuttings into some rooting compound, but if you do so, you only need a very small amount. No-one seems to know why, but cuttings seem to prefer to be up against the plastic side(s) of pots or containers. If you have a propagator, water the cuttings well and place the pot in the propagator. If you don't have a propagator, a simple way to make one is to insert some 12" (30 cm) pea sticks around the edge of the pot, then place a clear plastic bag over the pea sticks and secure it to the pot using an elastic band). Put the pot in a warm place like a greenhouse or a windowsill indoors. Keep an eye on it and be patient, eventually you will (hopefully) see new growth start to appear. When the new growth is apparent, remove the elastic band, but leave the bag in place for a week or so. You can then remove it and pot up your new plants.

Ah well Dear Reader, it seems I have run out of both time and space, so I'd better cease my inane ramblings and send this epic to the Dragon editorial team. Hopefully I will still be around to pen another masterpiece next month, so until then, Happy Gardening!

### News from the Gardens of Easton Lodge

April is the start of the main season at the Gardens – we open weekly on Thursdays, starting on  $4^{th}$  April, and our first main season Open Day is on  $21^{st}$  April.

Through March we hope the weather will have allowed us to get planting. A range of new trees for the Glade, including Cercidiphyllum (Katsura) and Acers, will have been fine going into wet soil, but elsewhere we hope the ground will have dried out, so that grass returns to the mud patches created by the standing water in February. Our volunteers will have worked to extend the Japanese garden and planted more shrubs and small conifers into the new Warwick border (behind the croquet lawn). In the kitchen garden much of the early sowings of peas and beans will have been in pots, so by April we can transfer plants and hopefully avoid them being eaten by all the wildlife in the garden - the mice, slugs, moles and pigeons to name a few!



The joys of April should be the spring flowers and blossom. After working to clear some woodland, we hope the bluebells will be able to come through more strongly and there may be the tail end of the daffodils, cowslips and violets. In the Italian garden the tulips should be providing bright colours to the fresh greens of spring growth. In the kitchen garden there will be a succession of blossom. The first blossom is the nectarines and peaches in March, followed by

plum and cherries. By April it should be pears and apples. In the Glade there will be blossom on the flowering cherries and hawthorn.

The Gardens are open from 11am to 3pm on Thursdays, with payment on the Gate. Our volunteers provide hot and cold drinks and homemade cakes. For the Open Day on 21 April, 11am-5pm there will be folk and acoustic music from Karen and Tony, children's craft and trail and the usual fayre for a Sunday: hot bacon rolls, cheese or hummus rolls, homemade soup and cakes. 
When his brilliant talk came to an end he judged our competition for a children's book. The winning entry being a delightful rag book dating from 1914.

For 300 years, the Royal Gunpowder Mills at Waltham Abbey developed and manufactured explosives for muskets, rockets and wartime munitions. Today, it is a museum. Richard Thomas, a site guide, spoke at our February meeting, looking back through the centuries to China, and the discovery of what we now call gunpowder. It was fascinating, and a trip to the Waltham Abbey Museum, now looks on the cards.

In February our Gardening Group enjoyed a talk by Dave Willett, on Great Gardens and Gardeners. From the history of cultivated gardens such as the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, through the development of the medieval plot essential for food production, to renaissance gardens like Versailles, the landscape movement and Lancelot Brown, and the work of Arts and Crafts designers such as Gertrude Jekyll, much of which resulted in gardens we can still enjoy today.

As I write, we are looking forward to hearing from David Morson. Last year he talked about the historical relationship between Russia and Ukraine. At our first Saturday seminar in 2024, he will take on another of the world's most sensitive and tragic flashpoint-' The Arab Israel Question: A History of Conflict'. David who has degrees in history, politics, sociology and religious studies, will provide the opportunity to discuss and understand the historical background, from biblical times onwards, showing the established facts, the complexities, the dilemmas and the difficulties that have created probably the most intractable and long-lasting conflict in the world today.

And then on to something very different! Graham and Mary Brace spend their retirement travelling to photograph wildlife and conservation. In April, at our General Meeting, they will share their experiences and the amazing photographs they took of 'Wildlife in Brazil'.

That's the u3a: always something different, sometimes challenging, often heartwarming, you learn a lot and laugh a lot - do join us!

### The Hundred Parishes Society

The Society's logo is a wood-cut by the late Eric Ravilious. Eric Ravilious and Edward Bawden were both Royal College of Art students when, on a cycling holiday,



they happened upon Great Bardfield in Essex. There, they rented Brick House, starting a fascinating period for the village. Over the next two decades, numerous artists came to live there; they became known as The Bardfield Artists.



In 1932 Bawden married fellow student Charlotte Epton, a potter, and his father bought Brick House as a wedding present for them. In the same year Ravilious married Tirzah Garwood, an artist and engraver, and they lodged for a while with the Bawdens at Brick House. Bawden's work can be seen today on three Victoria Line stations - Victoria. Tottenham Hale and Highbury & Islington - for which he designed the logos.

Another artist, John Aldridge, bought Place House in Great Bardfield in 1933 and soon became friends with Bawden. They produced Bardfield Wallpaper together for the company Cole & Sons to distribute.

In 1952, painter Stanley Clifford-Smith moved into Bucks House and later to the Old Bakehouse. He was very involved in Open House exhibitions that were held in the 1950s ,when the public could view and buy art in the studios and homes where it had been created.

Marianne Straub, a textile designer, moved to Great Bardfield in 1953, buying Trinity Cottage. She was the senior designer for Warner & Sons of Braintree.

Other Bardfield Artists included Kenneth Rowntree, Michael Rothenstein and Walter Hoyle.

A good selection of the Barfield Artists' work can be seen at Fry Art Gallery in Saffron Walden – it reopens on April 7th – see <u>https://fryartgallery.org/</u> for opening hours. In Great Bardfield, books and other information about the artists can be purchased at the new premises of Between The Lines bookshop.

### Reverend Louis Wilson writes.....

I wonder if you know the story of the Shunammite woman in 2 Kings 4: 8-37? It takes place in the northern kingdom of Israel during the ministry of Elisha the prophet. In the village

of Shunem, a well-to-do woman and her husband serve him regularly with food and accommodation.

What can be done for this woman? Elisha wonders.

His servant says: She has no son and her husband is old. The Shunammite woman was not looking for any payment for her services, but God knows what would be the perfect gift and a year later according to Elisha's promise, she gives birth to a precious child.

This gift points to another miraculous birth 700 years later – the Lord Jesus Christ, fully human and yet fully God.

But the woman's joy is short lived. The boy grew and one day he went out to his father in the fields saying: *My head! My head!* In alarm, his father had him carried to his mother's lap but by noon that day, he was dead. The Shunammite woman's grief is unimaginable.

However, she saddles a donkey and heads off to find Elisha the man of God. Perhaps, she reasoned, if Elisha's God could bring life from a barren womb, he could bring her son back from the dead. When she finds Elisha, she asks: *Did I ask you for a son, my Lord? Didn't I tell you, don't raise my hopes?* 

Elisha goes to the boy and, in answer to his earnest prayers, the Lord gives life to the boy through Elisha's body. The boy sneezed seven times and opened his eyes.

It is a story that points to one even greater than Elisha. Every time we read about God raising the dead, it is supposed to remind us of Easter. The prophet greater than Elisha is Jesus, who willingly gave his life for our sin and then rose from the dead.

The Easter message is that because Jesus was a man, he could take in our place the punishment our sin deserves. And because he was God, death had no power over him.

Every time we read about God raising someone from the dead, like the Shunammite woman's son, it is supposed to remind us of Jesus' resurrection and power over death. God uses that same power to save all those who believe in

#### **Reports and Recommendations**

Greens and Village Estate – Cllr. Baker:

Greens damage – (1) Erosion - Following a discussion, it was previously agreed a review of the damage will be conducted in the spring by the Chair and Cllr Leech, including review of flooding on the greens by Heathfield.
(2)Driveways across greens and construction damage to greens by Hollybank – It was previously agreed the Chair and Cllr Leech will assess the damage. This will be carried out when the greens have dried out.
(3)Construction damage to greens by York Cottage – It is noted that there is damage to the greens on the driveway. The Parish Council will monitor whilst

works are still ongoing.

**Coronation commemoration** – A generous resident, who is very skilled at ironmongery, has kindly offered to design and make a sculpture in the shape of a globe with dimensions 1200mm by 1200mm. Sculpture is at the finishing stages, image and details of suggested mounting have been circulated to councillors prior to the meeting. Councillors discussed potential location and positioning of structure to ensure safety (ie prevent climbing) and mowing accessibility. Chair to liaise with Cllr Fisher and the resident.

**Tree Inspection** – Report is now received and circulated to councillors prior to the meeting. Quote for recommended works awaited.

**Resurfacing The Row** – The Row path falls within the ownership of the Henham Parish Council as it is part of the greens. Cllr Leech has reviewed the damage and provided a quote of  $\pounds 640$  plus VAT to undertake the works, agreed nem con.

**Portrait of King** – The government is issuing free portraits of the King. Chair has consulted with OSCA committee who have agreed that HPC can apply for a free portrait. The parish council will pay for framing with installation in OSCA, exact location to be agreed. Portrait has now been ordered by the Chair.

**Village ponds/Woodland** – (a) It was previously agreed that Cllr Franklin would liaise with ELNR regarding the woodland, Cllr Walker would liaise with the National Trust and Cllr Rutterford would liaise with our ecologist regarding suggestions for other entities which may like to take responsibility for the woodland. Cllr Walker has been liaising with the NT team at Hatfield Forest and a meeting was organised on 21/3/24.

**Community Garden** – A local company has approached the Parish Council with regard to establishing a community garden for the benefit of local residents. A meeting date is awaited.

**Village Hall** – **Solicitors** - Have been instructed to review the ownership and responsibility for the Village Hall as the existing documentation is 100 years old and needs updating. Our solicitors have been chasing the Charity Commission for an update on the Village Hall; they have been informed that they have been allocated a case worker and should hopefully speak to someone imminently.

**PCSO** – The PCSO is visiting the village shop on the following dates, residents are encouraged to use this opportunity to raise any concerns they may have: 5th April - 1045-1200, 24th April - 1045-1200. Chair has been liaising with the police in charge regarding the PCSO contract renewal. It is noted that Elsenham Parish Council is re-joining the scheme, with no financial impact on the Parish Council's financial contribution.

**Management of Pledgdon Green** – (a) **Ownership of Common Land** - Legal advice re ownership/responsibilities of the common land has established that the Parish Council is not responsible for the common land. Barrister's Legal Opinion has now been circulated to all councillors which confirms the position that the Parish Council is not responsible for the common land. Cllr Rutterford will liaise with the local farmer who might be able to obtain a grant for its upkeep. (b) Conservation Area Status - Broxted Parish Council is exploring whether the Brick End Road area could become a Conservation Area and they have asked whether Henham Parish Council would be interested in splitting the costs (£1170 plus VAT) for Place Services to look into extending the proposed conservation area to include to the Pledgdon Green area. It was agreed nem con for the Parish Council to contribute towards half of the cost.

**Website** – The new website is up and running <u>https://henham-pc.gov.uk</u>. Annual hosting, support and maintenance fees for the coming year have been paid by the clerk - £500 plus VAT.

**Village Broadband** – Openreach and Gigaclear both have plans to bring Ultrafast Broadband to Village. The Parish Council has a responsibility to ensure residents are fully informed of both endeavours and have the information to make an informed decision that suits them: (1) **Openreach** Openreach surveys are nearly complete and they are already working on building the network and hoping to roll out in the early summer. (2) **Gigaclear** - Cllr Lee attended an open event at OSCA on 5/3/24 and Gigaclear advised that they are about four weeks behind schedule, roll out to commence in April. **Bloor** – **UTT/23/2063/DFO** – proposed details following outline approval of reserved matters (comprising landscaping, layout, scale and appearance) pursuant to outline approval S62A/2022/0012 (UTT/22/2760/PINS) for the development of 200 residential dwellings along with landscaping, internal roads, public open space and associated infrastructure works, Land East Of Station Road. Sub planning committee will raise a concern with UDC planning regarding proposed run off to Old Mead Road.

**Proposed Development at Saffron House paddock** – The Developer has written to the Clerk requesting a meeting with the Parish Council to discuss a proposed development of three houses in the paddock behind Saffron House, High Street. The Chair and Cllr Lee met with the developer on 27/2/24. Proposed draft plans now amended to avoid construction near the badger set. Solicitors have been instructed to obtain barrister legal opinion, estimated legal fee £1600 plus VAT.

**Proposed Solar Farm** – Elsenham Quarry owners are proposing a solar farm on part of their land. See website https://www.innov8planning.com/current-consultations-1 for full details of the proposed development. The proposed site falls within the parish of Henham, not Elsenham. There was a drop-in session on Thursday 7th March organised by the Valencia. Cllrs Walker and LeCount to attended and will report back to the Parish Council.

### Highways – Update

<u>OMR-OML</u> – Nothing to report other than OMR to be closed 20/3/24 for three days for Essex Highways to carry out drainage investigations and repairs. Cllr LeCount to liaise with local residents re ongoing excessive HGV use of Old Mead Road and Toot Toot bridge.

<u>School parking</u> - The Chair and County Cllr Gooding attended a meeting with a parent and Headmaster of the school on 8/2/24 to discuss dangerous parking. It was agreed that the Headmaster would send out to parents/carers a warning note that police enforcement would take place soon with penalties enforced. PCSO would arrange police enforcement visits. County Cllr Gooding will commence steps to organise School Lane as a 'School Street' on arrival and departure times. This means the Street will be closed to vehicles save residents at beginning of day and end of the school day. He will also liaise with the relevant ECC staff member responsible for the 'walking bus' initiative to explore possibility of making OSCA a drop off point, where children are then walked to the school.

<u>Potholes</u> – Serious concerns have been raised by Cllr Leech to County Cllr Gooding regarding urgent repairs required to the 1m deep pothole on Thaxted Road by Plegdgon Barns. Cllr Rutterford has also contacted the Essex County Cllr responsible for Highways regarding the urgent repairs required to Thaxted Road, which is now closed.

<u>Informal consultation re Footpath 25 -</u> It is proposed by ECC to divert a section of Footpath 25 Henham from within the grounds of Starr Garage to the route along Hall Close. Chair has been liaising with the owner of the property and ECC, as the footpath has always been along Hall Close and the owner wishes to have this formalised and existing records corrected. The Chair has responded on behalf of the Parish Council confirming its agreement with this proposal. No formal order has been made as yet.

Residents are encouraged to also report any matters to Essex Highways direct via the Essex Highways web site <u>www.essexhighways.org</u> (details also on the Henham Website), as the more people who complain regarding Highways matters the more likely something will get done.

#### Correspondence

Sent/Received: email from resident re Starr Road flooding and pot holes, various correspondence with Bellway re flooding on site, Essex Highways re footpath 25, various website enquiries.

**Waste and Minerals Development Issues - Local Plan Review – 2025 to 2040** – The proposal is that the quarry is extended right down to the B1051, Pledgdon Green Lane, Pledgdon Green. The consultation was from 6th February to 19th March 2024. Response is now completed and advice for residents posted on Facebook and the website. Stansted, Elsenham and Broxted Parish Councils are also responding. The Parish Council thanks the resident at Pledgdon Green for all his valuable input together with our ecologist, the Chair and Cllr Rutterford for producing such a comprehensive response.

**SAW** (**Stop Stansted Expansion**) – It is now intended to convert SAW into a Community Interest Company ('CIC') rather than a Discretionary Trust, following legal advice. A CIC is a relatively new concept. It is a social enterprise which exists to benefit the community rather than private shareholders. The activities of CICs are overseen by the CIC Regulator to whom



CICs must submit an annual report and accounts, which are published, to ensure transparency. The AGM, held on 7 March, included a resolution seeking authorisation to establish the CIC. The resolution makes clear that the CIC will have the same or very similar objectives to the current objectives of Stansted Airport Watch. The agenda also includes the (re-)election of officers and committee for the period to 30 September 2024. This reflects the current expectation that it will take several months to complete the transition from Stansted Airport Watch to Stansted Airport Watch CIC.

**Governance** – The Parish Council Standing Orders and Financial Regulations have been circulated by the Clerk to all Councillors for review in the coming months. No update required.

Local Plan – Documents related to the local plan can be found at: <u>www.uttlesford.gov.uk/new-local-plan</u>. Discussion on the draft Local Plan has now been published on the UDC website. Chair's letter regarding the incorrect allocation of 200 Bloor homes to Elsenham Parish has been sent to UDC and was acknowledged by UDC but unfortunately no amendments made to the published draft local plan. Chair submitted comments on the Local Plan on behalf of Henham Parish Council. Nothing further to report.

### **District Councillor's Report**

We have commissioned a Cross Party Operational Resilience Task and Finish Group to draw and apply learning from the recent waste collection situation to prevent recurrence. To take those lessons learned and apply them more broadly across the organisation, in order to identify any points of structural weakness or risk and recommend proportionate mitigating measures. The final report will be available at the end of April.

Before the recent disruption in collections, we had decided to give readers some background detail about the refuse service. UDC's budget for its refuse service function is some £12.22 m gross pa or £5.85 m net pa, after recovery of fees etc. Currently, the district wide service is provided by nine large and one smaller frontline refuse vehicles, together with three spare/standby older vehicles. Our vehicles are equipped to receive two grades of material at one collection ie either the non-recycling (black lids) or recycling (green lids) in alternate weeks, plus food caddy contents every week.

A decision has been taken to improve substantially the service and increase the proposed budget for 2024/2025 to allow for the purchase of three additional refuse vehicles (each costs about £285,000) as well as the recruitment of additional loaders and driving personnel. This will increase the number of rounds, leading to the improvement in the reliability and speed of completion. This will enable an improved (and necessary) service response. In the recent past, Essex County Council had closed the waste transfer station in Great Dunmow, where our vehicles previously emptied their loads. This has meant that the vehicles now have to travel to Braintree refuse centre and the longer transit distances (an extra 45 minutes each way) result in slower/less efficient completion of the existing rounds. Further, the 15% population growth experienced in the district over the past decade also has caused greater volumes for processing. All this means that greater resources are needed and a commitment to provide that has been made and had already been planned for.

Our district recycling performance is interesting and compared with the other eleven local authorities in Essex, we perform very well in regard to our "green" bin effective recycling rate where we come top of the district at 29%. Our black bin recycling rate is much lower however, where we stand in ninth position at 20%; the "top" authority recorded a rate by comparison of 33%. Food waste collected via the brown caddies shows the district performance being ranked in the middle of the peer group at 8.9%.

Our agreed budget has, as stated above, extra provision for more bin crews and lorries in the waste collection service, more money to tackle the climate crisis, ongoing support for vulnerable residents, more money for disabled facilities grants, and funding for some new social housing projects. Garden waste charges will not be increased this year and we will be providing a better service to mitigate the previous issues.

This comes amidst a backdrop of challenging financial pressures for local councils which are facing diminishing sources of income from central government at the same time as increasing demand for and cost of service delivery, alongside high inflation.

Uttlesford is not immune to these pressures and identified a need to find  $\pounds$ 7.4m in net savings by 2027/28. The council is two years into a five-year change programme which will radically alter the way it operates over the coming years and is looking at ways to maximise sustainable income streams and find service-level efficiencies. This programme is already contributing  $\pounds$ 2.1m of income and savings towards the target.

The balanced budget proposed for the next year financial year includes some increases to fees and charges, including a first rise in eight years in car park charges, as well as some use of financial reserves, as encouraged by central government. It is also proposing a 2.99% increase in council tax - the equivalent of an extra 10p per week for residents in a Band D property. This brings the amount charged to local residents by the district council up to about £3.50 per week for the full range of services. This modest increase will allow vital services provided by the district council to continue whilst also helping to support vulnerable residents. The plans include provision for more than double the amount spent this year in the cost-of-living council tax discount scheme to households who may be under the most pressure. This is in addition to the most generous local council tax support scheme in Essex for vulnerable residents and those on a low income.



The days are getting longer, the air a little warmer, the ground a little firmer (maybe), it's that time of year again.




Brush off the running shoes, iron your shorts and join the Monday evening runners.


