

Henham Village Shop News

BIG BROTHER STRIKES AGAIN!

Many readers will be aware of how hard the Village Shop Committee and the Parish Council have worked to retain our post office in Henham.

Our post office was suddenly regarded as an outreach location several years ago and the Post Office have subsequently charged us an annual fee for trading. With help from the PC and Standon PO we have overcome this and traded on.

Now we have another problem in that Royal Mail, who are contracted to collect mail from Post Office branches, say they will only collect from core post offices and not outreach locations any more. If this goes ahead it will mean that our post office will be unable to process parcels and special mail.

There are ongoing discussions with Royal Mail and there is a possibility of collections if we are willing to pay an ongoing fee.

For the present there is no immediate change as our parcels are still being collected. We are hopeful that this will not change.

We will of course fight on and keep everyone informed.

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In the Garden



Greetings Dear Reader,

Well, here we are again, moaning about the weather as usual, only this time I think we are perfectly justified. It really has been a pretty awful summer. It has been really difficult for us gardeners, as a lot of the time it has been almost impossible to work. Unusually low temperatures and lots of wind and rain (at least there shouldn't be a hosepipe ban this year!), have made this summer a difficult one. One slight consolation is that the soft ground makes the ongoing task of weeding a lot easier, you just have to make sure you don't pull up half a bucket full of soil as well as the weed.

August is a time when the borders should still be a mass of colour, but deadheading becomes an even more important task if you want to prolong the season. I still get asked quite frequently how to differentiate between new buds and dying flowers on Dahlias. It is actually quite easy, new buds are firm and round, but dying flowers are pear-shaped and soft. Dahlias are a prime target for slugs and earwigs and the wet weather has exacerbated the problem. One way to deal with earwigs is to fill a flowerpot with grass or straw and place it upside down near the plant. The earwigs collect in the pot as they hide from the light and the pot can be emptied each day and the earwigs disposed of as you wish.

If you prefer to go for quality rather than quantity with Chrysanthemums and Dahlias, pinch out the two side buds on each stem, leaving just the central bud. This should present you with a single, much larger flower.

When you are deadheading, always try to cut back to a leaf joint rather than just nipping off the flower head. This gives a much better chance of new flowers being produced. This applies particularly to roses. Continue cutting sweet peas for indoor displays, as the more you cut them, the longer they will continue to flower. If seed pods do appear despite your best efforts, be sure to remove them.

Continue pinching out the side shoots of cordon tomatoes and try to feed them regularly. If you are growing them in a greenhouse, feed them every other watering; if outside, then once a week should suffice. To speed up the ripening process, it is a good idea to remove all the leaves growing below the first truss. I take this process even further. Once the fruits are starting to increase in size, I shorten the leaves back to 2 or 4 side leaves. This lets more light reach the fruits and further aids ripening. An even more effective way of speeding up the

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Finish pruning shrubs which have flowered, such as Escallonia, Lavender, deciduous species of Lonicera (Honeysuckle) and Senecio. Well established vigorous Wisteria may need cutting back at this time. Take out the tips of young shoots after they have made three or four leaves.


Some time ago I wrote about a possible remedy for the damage caused to grassy areas by dog urine. The item in question is an unidentified type of rock product, which is placed in the dog's water bowl. Having tried this for a period of time, I am pleased to say that it does appear to work. The only downside is that the rocks are quite expensive and have to be replaced after two or three months. Remember that it is only the females that cause the problem with the grass. (This is actually true and should not be construed as a sexist remark).

I don't know if you are like me, but every spring, as plants start to appear, I find I can't remember what a lot of them are. I now have a new approach. As plants die down, I'm putting a T-label in the bed just in front of them to identify them. When doing this, I use another of my "*useful*" tips. I have found that, no matter which type of "*permanent*" marker I use, by the time the following spring comes around, the label is completely indecipherable. Some time ago, I advocated applying a coat of clear nail varnish to the label. This keeps the writing crystal clear and can be removed by peeling it off with a sharp knife. Nice to know that at least some of my tips work!

On the basis of that, here is another one that I know works. Ladybirds are one of the garden's most useful predatory insects and will happily feed for hours on troublesome greenfly. To ensure that ladybirds are resident in your garden from early spring, you need to provide them with a safe haven where they can overwinter. The best thing is an old egg box, opened up and pushed, upside down, into a hedge, under a shed, or anywhere where it will be relatively dry and undisturbed through the winter months. The ladybirds will find the egg compartments warm, dry and safe from predators.

Well Dear Reader, I have probably rambled on for long enough for this month. Let us hope that the weather is a little kinder to us for the rest of the summer. Hopefully I will return next month with some more wittering for you and I also hope to have a little surprise for you. I will leave you with that puzzling thought and wish you once again, "*Happy Gardening*".

Reports and Recommendations

Greens and Village Estate – Cllr. Baker:

Greens Damage – It was previously agreed that various greens work would be undertaken. This is ongoing. Additional work now authorised to clear debris from the felled tree in Crow Street.

Greens Bylaws – As part of the ratification process the Parish Council needs to consult with residents regarding the new proposed bylaws. The draft Bylaws have been posted on the website and on Facebook on 26^{th} June 2024. Residents have until 14^{th} July to respond.

Greens Access – It was previously agreed the Chair would write to owner/ developers confirming the Parish Council's HPC greens access policy. Chair has now written to owners of Saffron House re greens access.

Coronation Commemoration – Cllr Leech has installed the sculpture. Cllr Fisher will look into organising an opening ceremony. The Parish Council thanks Chris Mowbray of Henham Essex Metal Fabrications for creating and donating the sculpture to our village. The sculpture will be removed shortly for painting and realignment.

Church Works – The car parked at the Church has been removed.

Resurfacing The Row – Repairs will be undertaken in due course.

Village Ponds/Woodland – Cllr Walker continues to liaise with Planteria, the School and Woodland Trust regarding the woodland and the school's curiosity approach to learning – a very productive meeting between them was held on 13^{th} June attended by Cllr Walker and Chair which included positive discussions about how to utilise the woodland for the benefit of the school and community. A tour of the woodland for Planteria owners was undertaken on 3^{rd} July.

Village Hall – **HPC Community Support Fund** – Cllr Fisher is re-appraising the Community Support Fund.

PCSO – The PC have signed up to a further contribution to the costs of the PCSO. Chair will write to police service requesting better accountability for the PCSO time.

Speedwatch – (a) It was previously agreed Cllr Franklin would apply for VAR signage on OMR and submit an application form to Essex Highways, County Cllr has confirmed his support in writing for this application (b) Update re TruCam: a police representative visited the Speedwatch Team on 4^{th} July and

are planning an exercise to use True Cam in the near future. The use of True Cam will mean that fines and points will be issued for speeding and othe traffic offences. (c) Cllr Walker has purchased a suitable bodycam for the Speedwatch Team for £84.99.

Management of Pledgdon Green – (a) Ownership of Common Land - Cllr Rutherford is liaising with the local Farmer re maintenance of greens. (b) Conservation Area Status - Clerk has asked Broxted PC to see if the report has been issued, nothing received as yet.

D Day June 2024 Celebrations – The Parish Council thanks everyone involved in making the event such a success and in particular, Simon Bambridge. Parish Council's net contribution was £1812.66 (band, bins, licence and toilet hire).

Stansted/Elsenham Surgery Merger – Stansted Surgery and Elsenham Surgery will be formally joining contracts to work together as one GP practice with effect from 1 July 2024. All patients have been sent communications direct from the surgeries regarding the merger.

Village Post Office - With effect from Monday 24th June, Royal Mail (a privately owned company separate from Post Office Ltd) have said that they will stop collecting mail from satellite branches like Henham. This means that from 24th June our village branch will not be able to accept ANY parcels or special orders such as guaranteed deliveries of currency orders. **Editor's Note: Parcels are still being collected as the Dragon goes to print.** They will continue to serve for Banking Services like cash withdrawals and cheque or cash deposits but otherwise only small packets, able to fit in the Post Box, plus letters can be accepted. Royal Mail said they could continue to collect if we paid £2000 per annum for the service but the shop has said they will not pay this on top of the already large Post Office charges which is paid by HPC. At present the Post Lady collects the mail from us on her routine rounds at no additional cost. Chair will meet with Chair of Village Shop to discuss.

Uttlesford Community Action Network (UCAN) – The Parish Council have been contacted by UCAN who currently have a number of enquiries from groups of volunteers who would like to volunteer together, and whether we might have any opportunities that arise for such groups to volunteer in our Parish. This might include litter picking, DIY or gardening (on community buildings, club buildings, school buildings), or helping out at a community event. Cllrs will consider the areas where this could be helpful. Cllr Walker will discuss with the School Governors.

UCAN AGM - Wednesday 24th July – Cllr Franklin will attend on behalf of the Parish Council.

Treasury Management Investment Policy and Strategy 2023/24 – Cllr **Fisher** Cllr Fisher has been researching the best interest paying accounts which comply with our investment policy. This is ongoing.

Signing of AGAR 2023-24 for Henham PC – Paperwork submitted to our external auditors by the clerk on 14th June..

Clerk Bonus – The Parish Council has agreed to award the clerk a two - month salary bonus, this will be paid in four equal instalments from August to November.

Planning and Developments -

UTT/24/1507/HHF – Proposed demolition and replacement of existing outbuilding with previously approved proposed outbuilding, Cedar Cottage, Crow Street – Cllr Lee declared an interest and absented himself from any discussion.

Notice of a planning application received re Saffron Hall – No formal notification received from UDC planning as yet. Sub planning committee have agreed to seek professional planning advice from our planning expert. Cllr Fisher declared an interest and absented himself from any discussion.

Developments:

UTT/24/0670/DFO (Re-Consultation) Mill Road Development (45 houses): Cllr Walker is liaising with Bellway regarding resident foul water concerns. All other PC issues have been dealt with.

Bloor – **UTT/23/2063/DFO (200 houses)** – **Land East of Station Road** – Cllr Franklin attended a meeting with Bloor and EPC 2/7/24. Issues are S106 - surgery contribution, footpath at the level crossing, and drainage into Old Mead Road system. Briefing note prepared by Cllr Franklin was circulated to all Cllrs by clerk prior to this meeting. Minutes circulated by Clerk to all Cllrs 5/7/24.

Bedwell Road - UTT/24/0543/OP (240 houses) – Land North of Bedwell Road and East of Old Mead Road Ugley and Henham. No news on planning hearing yet.

Decisions: UTT/23/1732/FUL – Proposed Change of use of paddock to residential and construction of 3 no. residential dwellings - Tudor Hall, Pledgdon Green. - Refuse

Highways Update <u>OMR-OML</u> – The outstanding highways issues in this area mainly relate to blocked gulleys (which are now being cleared along

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 07305 224 161 OMR and North Hall Road), faded road markings and carriageway defects, all requesting urgent action. There has been some work on these and Cllr Franklin will review the remaining issues in the Autumn.

<u>Essex Waste Lorries</u> - Cllr Fisher has contacted County Cllr Gooding with details of numerous resident complaints. The Parish Council understands that not much can be done as it is not illegal, but has been advised it should collate reports as evidence. Cllr LeCount continues to monitor. He awaits advice from Essex Highways and County Cllr Gooding.

<u>Footpath 32</u> – Cllr Franklin has established that the agreement to close the footpath relies on ECC providing an alternative footpath. Cllr Franklin will write to ECC and County Cllr Gooding asking why an alternative has not yet been provided.

Residents are encouraged to also report any matters to Essex Highways direct via the Essex Highways web site <u>www.essexhighways.org</u> (details also on the Henham Website), as the more people who complain regarding Highways matters the more likely something will get done.

Residents are encouraged to report unsafe or dangerous parking in our village to: <u>swilliams@uttlesford.gov.uk</u> Stansted Airport Limited operates a Freephone number for reporting suspected on-street airport related car parking. The Freephone number is: 0800 7312385

Local Plan – Documents related to the local plan can be found at: <u>www.uttlesford.gov.uk/new-local-plan</u>. **Local Plan numbers allocation** – The UDC Local Plan team have changed the rules and have not allocated the 200 houses to Henham as they are now basing allocation on a Settlement basis not a Parish basis. Therefore the 200 have been allocated to Elsenham not Henham. Solicitors have now been instructed by the Parish Council. Barrister now instructed. Chair has requested an update from Solicitors.

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Church News



The Reverend Louis Wilson writes....

The port city of Corinth in southern Greece was said to be all at once the New York, Los Angeles and Las Vegas of the ancient world. The things it valued and worshipped were money, sex, celebrity and sport - which doesn't sound terribly different from the values of our own day. The apostle Paul went to Corinth in about 50 AD and by God's grace was able to start a church.

In his letter, 1 Corinthians, he writes to remind the church that when he first came to them, it was not with great eloquence, superior wisdom or impressive appearance. Instead, he came in weakness, fear and trembling, with a message that was foolish and unimpressive – *For*, he says, *I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified.*

He reminded them that a church family will very rarely be full of those the world regards as wise and clever. It will rarely be full of this world's movers and shakers. It will rarely be full of dukes or princesses – because God habitually chooses to work through the foolish to shame the wise and through the weak to shame the strong.

One of my favourite stories of God's power shown in weakness concerns the missionary, Adoniram Judson.

Some 200 years ago, he travelled from his native New England to Burma which then as now was a completely closed country.

It took six years for him to see one person become a Christian. He spent two years in prison and suffered appalling torture. His wife died, followed within six months by their daughter. He married again but his second wife died, as did seven of his children in the disease and heat of Burma: he endured years of overwhelming loss and suffering.

And the work of Gospel sowing in Burma was long and hard, the reaping even harder. But in 1831, 19 years after he arrived, he was able to write: The spirit of enquiry is spreading everywhere. We have given away nearly 10,000 tracts, and we give only to those who ask.



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Some travel for two or three months to say: Sir, we've seen a writing that tells about an eternal God. Are you the man that gives away such writings? If so, please give us one, for we want to know the truth before we die.

Others, from the interior of the country, where the name of Christ is alittle known, come saying: -Are you Jesus Christ's man? Give us a writing that tells about Jesus Christ.

Adoniram Judson died in 1850, after a life of simply unbelievable weakness and loss. But by the time of his death, he had completed a translation of the Bible into Burmese, as well as a Burmese dictionary. Hundreds of converts were leading the church, and today in Myanmar (Burma), there are about 3700 congregations that trace their origin to Judson and, humanly speaking, to the weakness of his message and the weakness of his life.

God's power shown in weakness.

Amongst the rich heritage which is a distinguishing feature of The Hundred Parishes, there are many ancient houses that were built originally as a "hall house", sometimes referred to as an "open hall house".

Many surviving houses that were built between the mid-13th and early 17th centuries had a standard three-part layout: a central 'open hall' flanked by two crosswings. The crosswings were of two storeys and were the same height as the single-storey hall that linked them. Individual houses sometimes had variations to this basic design.

Daily life for members of the household was a communal affair, focused on the large central hall. It was heated by a fire that burned on a central hearth, its smoke rising to escape through vents in the roof. The use of a chimney to remove smoke generally came only in the 16th or 17th century.

The crosswing at one end of the house contained a parlour with a chamber above called the solar. They were used by the head of the household and their immediate family. The other crosswing was a service area, accessed from a passage with front and back doors at either end. The passage also gave entry to the hall, from which it was partly screened. Each wing had its own stairs to the upper floor of that wing.

Between about 1550 and 1650 AD, the open hall concept became less popular, with a desire for more privacy. Most open halls were re-modelled with the insertion of a floor to make them two storeys. The open hearth was replaced with a fireplace and chimney.

The Society's website includes more than a hundred downloadable walk routes. Almost half of the routes pass a former hall house and these are identified in the route description.


The Gardens of Easton Lodge

District Councillors' Report

The Local Plan

The Local Plan - History

Uttlesford has not had a local plan since 2005. The last one submitted was in 2020. The plan prepared by the previous administration was considered to be *unsound* and the inspectors *recommended withdrawal*. The new administration in UDC started this new plan, with a cross-party group, set up to lead the project. We as the administration stated that we would *not* try to influence the plan for political gain. We have been led to believe that previously politicians made deals, and the planning officers had to work around these political directives. Planning Directors call it "*Political red lines*"

The Local Plan – Evidence based

Understandably, those villages with housing allocations are disappointed and cross. We have made it very clear that the only way a Local Plan can be sound and passed by Inspectors is, if it is *evidence* led, *without* political prejudice. Though residents *may feel* that their representatives have not fought for them, *that is not the case*, elected representatives push for evidence to be proved and substantiated.

Faith in politicians nationally has been low and political decisions being made on the premise of re-election is self-promoting and frankly morally wrong!

The Local Plan – Reg 19

This proposed plan has considered feedback received during the previous stage of the local plan consultation, which was held last year and generated about 5,000 comments from 1,700 respondents, and also further work that has been carried out to address the issues then raised. A wide-ranging and comprehensive period of evidence gathering and testing underpins these revised proposals. Taking back control of a Local Plan doesn't just mean housing numbers, it means that we have more influence insisting on high standards and ensuring robust policies, instead of just having to effectively take what the developers want, because we do not have a local plan.

The Local Plan - How it could affect Henham

The Planning and Legal Consultants directed The Local Plan Team that administrative boundaries numberings are ill advised. Therefore, anything in Henham PC area that adjoins the settlement of Elsenham, in planning terms works for Elsenham and not Henham Village. Henham has been allocated 121 houses, which are to be built over the next twenty years. A Neighbourhood Plan ensures that allocations are where the Parish would like them, not where developers want. Well planned developments, that are sympathetically placed, support thriving villages and help to ensure the longevity of locally based schools as they provide housing for families with young children to populate them. Henham Primary School has a vibrant new head with big ideas. To risk losing such a village asset due to low cohort numbers is a reality that local primary schools in the district are facing.

If the motion is passed, the Local Plan will go out to consultation on 30th July.

We write this on the 12^{th} – in preparation. Please **do** respond to the consultation if the motion is passed.



Looking for a Holiday Read ?

The Trial by Robert Rinder (published by Penguin)

I was slightly sceptical when this book was recommended to me as I only knew of the author through his television appearances. However, I quickly changed my mind on reading it as Robert Rinder, who has been described as being Britain's best known criminal barrister, successfully brings his background to this compelling whodunit?



In a courtroom sensation Detective Inspector Grant Cliveden, an absurdly good looking D I who once saved the Queen from an assassination attempt and became a national hero, keels over in the witness box, just as he is about to give evidence. He has been poisoned, and all the evidence points to one man. The intrigue is how the defence handles the case, in particular the junior barrister, Adam Green, for whom it was his first murder case. The book reveals a behind the scene look at court room procedures, with humour and the twists and turns of the trial produce a compelling read.


The Nightingale by Kristin Hannah (published by St Martin's press)

Refuse & Garden Waste Collections: August 2024

Brown, black and green bin collections are made in most of Henham on Thursdays but there are a few areas where collections are made on Tuesdays The brown bin is collected weekly.

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
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
